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PICS SEASONAL WALK: CAPE WOOLAMAI: CLEELAND BIGHT TRACK

For our seasonal walk in November, 7 members and associates gathered at the surf beach carpark. Before leaving the carpark, we examined a fine example of Cape Woolamai granite that Mike Cleeland had brought along. Christine Grayden used a mini-dune nearby and a dibble spade to then demonstrate how her uncle Keith Grayden dug all the holes for the dune reclamation project (1974-1984). She then showed the group how the marram was planted in the holes.

Walking up the road about 80 metres, we came upon the track sign-posted "Cleeland Bight. 400m via track". At a leisurely pace, it takes about 15 minutes to reach the north-east edge of the Cape Woolamai tie bar, or tombola; the band of sand dunes that connect the granite mass at the end of the Cape with the rest of Phillip Island. The first section of the track has been gouged deeply into the dunes by the passage of many feet. Care is needed to negotiate some exposed roots, which, spreading widely, gave us an idea of how far the coast wattle, coast everlastings and other shrubs need to extend to gather enough moisture for survival. Indeed, the track takes us through an excellent example of successful dune revegetation, where prior to the 1970s there was little more than bare mobile sand. Some of us could remember, as kids, running up and tumbling down these shifting dunes, their surfaces sprinkled with chunks of calcarenite, that form of dune limestone that had often collected around the roots of a pre-settlement coastal scrubland.

In the reclamation work of the 1970s and 80s, first marram grass was established, with broadcast fertilizer, then followed up with the planting of indigenous shrubs and ground cover. Despite some present-day dieback of coast wattle, there are few bare areas now. Wallaby tracks are numerous, and one wonders whether grazing pressure from wallabies is limiting natural establishment of new seedlings, or will in the future. Small birds are also quite numerous. On the more sheltered dunes closer to Cleeland Bight, large coast banksias are evident. Mediterranean snails are commonly seen, but may not be a pest.

Reaching Cleeland Bight, we found the beach backed by steep, eroding sand cliffs, making access down to the beach difficult for the less able. The high tide, and the large number of fallen coast teatree and banksias that have been dislodged and litter the upper beach, on this occasion prevented us from continuing the walk towards the old Granite Quarry site, about another 40 minutes further to the south east.

We took the opportunity to spot various landmarks on the San Remo peninsula across the Eastern Passage, and to enjoy the view up to the bridge. Sand from this eroding beach is carried by tidal currents towards the bridge, nourishing the foredunes past Homestead Pt, the site of Woolamai House, the old Cleeland homestead.

We re-traced our steps back to the carpark, and while some retired for the day, the rest of the party continued on up the central track, as far as the staircase at the south-east end of the Cape Woolamai surf beach. They returned along the beach to the car park, to conclude an invigorating walk.

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PHILLIP ISLAND STRUCTURE PLAN: C88

Our thanks go to members Terry Nott (convenor), Margaret Hancock, Bessie Tyers, Bob Baird and Christine Grayden, and friend John Barnard QC, for all their work on the Rhyll Inlet Working Group preparing our submission on the area east of Coghlan Road for the Planning Panels Victoria hearing into the Structure Plan. These RIWG members made submissions for PICS on birdlife, potential acid sulphate soils, landscape issues and vegetation, which the Panel would not have got any other way. Terry had also prepared many maps which clearly illustrated the various points made by the four RIWG speakers. Margaret Hancock also presented material for PICS on other areas covered by the Structure Plan - i.e. especially Ventnor and many issues regarding Cowes such as availability of undeveloped land, traffic flows, supermarket placement, the value of caravan parks and public open space.

The presenters felt they had received a very good hearing, even though PICS was the last of the 'locals' to present to the Panel after four days of hearings, and that at the conclusion of our presentation the Panel members had a very good understanding of the environmental issues. We are still studying the newly released outcomes of the two week Panel hearing, but we do know that no extensions to the Ventnor township boundary will be allowed, and for the proposal for subdivision was rejected above the Rhyll Inlet for much of the

land there. A fuller report of the report's conclusions will be given at the AGM.

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MORNINGTON PENINSULA & WESTERN PORT BIOSPHERE

SPEAKER 2: Cecelia Witton, CEO, Mornington Peninsula and Western Port Biosphere: *Biosphere Reserves in a Changing World* at the Bass Coast Shire Environment Groups Get together, 29.8.09

The Mornington Peninsula and Westernport Biosphere was declared in 2002 and the Foundation established in 2003. Run by a Board with provision for Roundtables in each of the local government areas. Two main ongoing programs:

1. Watson Creek Integrated Catchment Management Program. Getting together people who would not normally talk in a no blame situation to find solutions to complex catchment problems.
2. Southern Brown Bandicoot Recovery Program in the Kooweerup, Bayles area involving a number of bodies such as DSE, Melbourne Water. Fox control program.

- Overseas Biospheres: Jeju Island, Republic of Korea Biosphere and World Heritage Area. Has a 600 mw power wind farm. Aiming for all renewable energy by 2050. 84% of their gdp comes from tourism.

Conference was called Climate Change and Island and Coastal Ecosystems

- Commander Island National and Biosphere Reserve - joint Russia/America - monitoring of seabirds
- Sunderbands, India. Overfishing and inundation of farmland by rising sea levels. Many people can no longer farm so the young gravitate to the cities, those remaining = the new poor.
- Palawan, Phillipines - issues are same as everywhere: resources, water, food, population.
- Cape West Coast, South Africa. Bad developments, farming issues, climate change. Increase in sea temperature due to climate change forced fish stocks to move. Mass death of lobsters due to hotter water.

Cecelia attended a conference in Jeju in May 2009 where she was able to promote our Biosphere and exchange much information. Biospheres were created before World Heritage, but many Biospheres are also WH sites. Her presentation focused on satellite mapping of our region.

- Indonesia has an abundance and diversity of natural resources, but also examples of severe exploitation. Logging in Sumatra has been monitored for 50 years, over which time it has reduced to less than approx 10%. The local population is under intense pressure to sell the timber to earn a living.

There are 15 Biospheres in Australia. Most are also National Parks.

- Conference on Ecotourism: How can Biospheres do it right? World wide tourism involves 700m travellers and is worth \$6.5 trillion. Nowadays people can seek a different type of tourism experience from just staying in resorts: e.g. paying to remove crown of thorns starfish from reefs. Ecotourism needs to make a profit, create social benefit and be inclusive of local culture, i.e. create respect for land and culture.

Climate change will create effects on tourism industry. Example of Africa where shrinking water holes, increasing temperature leading to increased evaporation, "hot spots" becoming too hot, and spread of disease (e.g. malaria from mosquitoes being able to live in areas previously too mild to support them).

The conferences resulted in valuable outcomes:

- Networking
- Showcase various Biospheres
- Gain an understanding of international work
- Learn about the Biospheres in other countries
- Increased understanding of climate change impacts
- Realize that issues being faced are world wide.

Future issues the MP&WP Biosphere may tackle:

- Encourage another Shapiro-style study
- Define sustainability indicators
- A mass balance project looking at inputs and outputs of power, water and waste
- Biodiversity inventory
- Facilitation of a waste management program
- Raising cultural awareness.

QUESTIONS:

- Is "Sustainability" meaningless? Needs to have triple bottom line: environmental, economic and social.

- What about airline traffic, which contributes to climate change but is intrinsically tied up with tourism? Depends on part of the world. Australia = distance, but in Europe planes are not essential to get around. May come a time when airlines set limits on how far you can fly.

- What is the Biosphere's role with the Port of Hastings development? Hopefully we can ensure that there is a proper Environment Effects Statement process. The Biosphere needs to be at the table and make sure the science is presented and informed decisions are made. Our role is not to be an activist against issues, but to have informed input.

- Is there hope for Sumatra? They are now looking to get medicines from the plants there to give the local people an income from the forests other than logging.

- What about population? Biosphere may be able to look at what the sustainable human population would be in the Biosphere, but there are many complex issues to do with population.

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TAKING IT TO THE STREETS!

Further to the 2009 AGM's request that the Committee consider ways of increasing membership, the Committee looked at numerous options and decided that a street stall would be a good way of taking our message to the public and possibly getting a few new members. Problems with public liability insurance were overcome when Cr Peter Paul was successful in getting Bass Coast Shire to cover us. Our stall was stocked with numerous environmental brochures from the Shire, Nature Park, Barb Martin Bush Bank, and our own brochure which will be available at the AGM. We also had 50 plants from the Bush Bank as give-aways to those interested. We were kept quite busy with enquiries from 10 a.m. til 1 p.m. on Saturday, 28th November, and gained a new member on the day - welcome to Dianne Grant! Many people took our brochure (illustrated with Terry Nott's drawings from our book), so we hope for some further new members. Our thanks go to Pauline Taylor, Penny Manning, Anne Davie, Margaret Hancock and Christine Grayden, who organised and staffed the stall. 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RED ROCKS COAST ACTION REPORT FOR 2009

- Email list of volunteers continues to grow.

- February extreme weather caused deaths of many of the seedlings that had established after planting near the western staircase the previous winter.
- This year's planting of 400 plants over a wide range of the Red Rocks coastal reserve has established well due to good Spring rains. We managed two planting days in July.
- Successful clean-up working bee was held in January and valuable control of woody weeds was achieved in October's working bee.
