The three new Wards of the Bass Coast Shire have seen the election in October of 8 out of 9 new Councillors and a Phillip Island Mayor, Pam Rothfield. PICS has congratulated the Councillors on their success and informed them of the Society's long history of supporting decisions that protect and enhance the Island's precious natural environment.

The Phillip Island and San Remo Visitor Economy Strategy 2035 Vision is that Phillip Island [including San Remo] is recognised nationally and globally as a world leading sustainable tourism destination, where tourism is embraced by the community.

The mild, damp Spring weather has seen the Island farms with good paddocks of grass that have resulted in a bumper season. The conditions have been excellent for all the plantings that have taken place across the Island in 2016. It is good to see that the Candowie Reservoir is at a very satisfactory level, as we go into summer.

As mentioned a while ago, the Conservation Society wants to produce a book titled "Women in Conservation on Phillip Island" for the 150th Celebration of Closer Settlement on the Island in 2018, the same year the Conservation Society will be celebrating 50 years since it began! Preserve Western Port Action Group Report

PWP is most pleased that all Council candidates at the last election were all anti- port. Councillors including Clare Le Serve, Michael Whelan and Geoff Ellis are the leading outspoken Councillors who are against the Port. We take this situation as a key success in our campaign in educating our community to the extent that all Councillors are against the Port.

PWP is pleased that comments provided during development of the PI & San Remo Visitor Strategy about the threat that a container port would have on the economy have been included in the documentation. However, whilst the SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) analysis including the threats were outlined in the Draft Strategy paper the SWOT was excluded from the final document. This was probably an attempt by the authors and reviewer's to remove any "inconvenient truths" from the spin in the final document. The SWOT analysis including the port threat are now on P78 of the Appendix document.

PWP representatives attended an Infrastructure Victoria (IV) community consultation on the location of another container port held at Hastings on 23/11. PWP was able to provide IV representatives with key documentation relating to the port proposal including Professor Kennedy comments, Coastal erosion reports etc. IV came to the consultation believing that Hastings was a natural deep water port and the only impact would be on Hastings. We made our points on the impact on other communities economies and environment including Phillip Island. We believe a shift occurred in the IV thinking about Hastings and the wider impact following the workshop.

PWP is preparing a submission to be lodged with IV around the end of this year. Given we have provided a lot of information to IV the submission will be reduced in complexity.

Sarah from the PI & SR Advertiser has interviewed myself in preparation for a feature article they intend to run in early December. Others including PWP committee members will also be interviewed.

PICS the winner from Work Experience Offer

It is not every day that a dedicated young person offers to spend a week of their time helping with conservation work. So when that offer came from Deakin University Environmental Science student, Jye Anderson, we jumped at it. Jye, who grew up on Phillip Island, was required by his university course to do 80 hours work experience, and he chose to do 40 hours with PICS and 40 hours with Bass Coast Landcare Network. Being familiar with Jye's approach to field work after meeting him at several working bees earlier in the year, I knew that as his PICS supervisor, I would not be disappointed, and that, together, we could achieve a lot.

Now that the work experience period has finished, Jye and I look back on an enjoyable and productive time working mostly at Scenic Estate Reserve, but also Red Rocks and on mangrove planting at Grantville. We have collected and tentatively identified up to 15 moss and liverwort species from SER, and started a photo gallery of flowering plants. We have continued the monitoring program of sea spurge germination near Justice Rd, and participated in a successful "Spurgebusters" morning, clearing out sea spurge from Justice Rd to Red Rocks and removing Boneseed. Blue Periwinkle has been hunted out and removed from previously infested areas at Red Rocks.

Jye has helped me continue the salinity monitoring project at SER, and helped set up the monitoring of cliff erosion on the coast there. Site maintenance has included removal of disintegrating guards, and control of thistles and Stinkwort. We have also measured the impact of herbicide on Swamp Paperbark encroaching on nature grassland.

Mangrove seed has been collected at different places along the coast, and secured to bamboo stakes in a new, direct-seeding method being trialled to establish mangroves on eroding shorelines. 100 were recently planted in this way at SER and nearly 300 at Grantville.

In addition, Jye has taken part in surveys to establish our order of plants for 2017 with the Barb Martin Bush Bank, contributed to discussion of Stage 2 planning at SER, been an observer at a recent PICS committee meeting and helped plan our 11th Dec working bee, where he demonstrated mangrove planting.

Our sincere thanks to Jye for his invaluable assistance with all of these projects. After Christmas he heads off to Costa Rica for several months to help with preservation of sea turtles. We will be looking forward to Jye being our guest speaker at our April 2017 PICS General Meeting, when he will present a summary of his work experience with PICS and BCLN and his exciting Costa Rican experience. Bon voyage, Jye!

Planning Matters

Over the holiday period, please watch out for pink notices on fences. These will be planning permit applications.

1. The proposal for a caravan park at Forrest Caves has re-emerged.
2. Two adjacent one acre lots in Red Rocks Road (backing onto Toscana Rise) are mooted to be the site of townhouse developments.
3. The Isle of Wight site has been sold.
4. There is no reliable news about the future of the airfield.
5. Some ratepayers are clamouring for a bigger transfer station on Phillip Island – but no potential site has been identified.
6. The car ferry proposal continues to 'bubble along'.

We can expect movement in all these areas during the holiday period – so watch out!!

A crafty solution to plastic pollution – by Lauren Jones

We all know plastic is bad for our environment, from its production through to disposal. Worldwide an estimated 8.4 million tonnes of plastic enter our marine environment from land-based sources each year. It is estimated our oceans now contain more than five trillion microplastic particles. This plastic is impacting over 800 marine species, including over half of all seabirds, mammals and 85% of sea turtles. Let's do something fun, sustainable and inclusive on a local level that solves part of this global plastic problem.

Who has a cupboard, drawer or car boot full of reusable supermarket shopping bags? Me. Who has forgotten to bring this collection with them to the shops? Me. Who has done a Plastic Bag Walk of Shame from the checkout to the car? Me. Australians use about **four billion single or limited use plastic supermarket bags annually** – that's 170 bags for every man, woman and child in the country.

Enter Boomerang Bags.

Boomerang Bags is a not-for-profit community-driven initiative tackling plastic bag pollution at the grassroots level by sewing sustainable alternatives to single-use plastic bags.

Each Boomerang Bag is hand-made by local community members using donated, second-hand materials, keeping the initiative local and sustainable. Boomerang Bags are then placed in bag-share boxes in central shopping precincts, such as Cowes, where shoppers can borrow and bring back a bag if they forget to bring their own reusable bag, or the bags can be 'boomerang'd' to friends, family, colleagues or to the bag-less stranger in front of you at the checkout.



This simple model has worked a treat in over 52 communities around Australia, after kicking off on the Gold Coast in 2014, as it provides both environmental and community benefits. It's seen an estimated 25 million plastic bags replaced so far and is a fantastic way to engage and connect community members from all backgrounds and all ages. You don't

need to know how to sew, you can donate material, provide a venue for sewing bees, deliver the bags to local shops, help with promotions and events, there's really something for everyone.

I'm currently working to build a Boomerang Bags community on Phillip Island. **A Community Info Session will be held in the new year at the Cowes Cultural Centre. Boomerang Bags forms part of Plastic Bag Free Phillip Island, a campaign driven by dedicated locals to educate and raise awareness about the problems with single use plastic bags. The aim is to activate the wider community to transition away from using them through school and community talks, beach clean ups and trivia nights. Aligned with BCSC's key environmental objectives and supported by Anthony Hill from Plastic Pollution Solutions, the campaign is currently in its formative stages with the aim to launch mid-2017.

Other reports - John Eddy reported on three PICS sub-committees: Red Rocks Coastcare; Saltwater Creek Coastcare; Friends of Scenic Estate Reserve.

General Business:

1. Anne reported that she had recently attended the Rural Women's Network for a two-day workshop, which made her very positive about the future of agriculture.
2. Anne also reported on the Gippsland Regional Waste and Resource Recovery Implementation Plan information session she attended, where they were told that Bass Coast Shire Council has set the bar very high for standards and are leading the way with the three bin system, including food scraps which will reduce the amount of methane coming off landfill site. GRWRR says there will be no need for a landfill on Phillip Island for at least 10 years, if at all. Trevor Ryan who runs the Grantville landfill site is very knowledgeable and is happy to give us a tour any time.
3. Margaret Hancock reported that some of the trees planted in Blue Gum Reserve last year have failed due to the weather, but more will be planted by the shire soon.
4. Anne reported that she, Margaret and Penny Manning had met with 2 BCSC planners recently. There is no movement on the Isle of Wight or Continental sites and no new subdivisions.
5. Margaret reported that Toscana Rise has been a big success and the valley is now well vegetated.
6. John Eddy reported that he had recently had word of some Banksias having been removed at Toscana Rise. To be investigated.
7. Terry Nott asked if there had been any application for the Cape Woolamai airfield. A: Not that we have heard.
